Preface

These orchestrations are designed to serve as accompaniments for the solos in Volumes 1 and 2 of the Suzuki repertory. While they are complete in themselves, the piano accompaniment or the second violin part in Suzuki's *Duets for Two Violins* may be used in conjunction with them.

The texture has been kept light in order to avoid covering an individual soloist or a small group. It should be kept in mind, however, that a group of fifty or more soloists, even with small violins, will cover a full string orchestra, and a piano may be needed for extra support in those circumstances.

The arrangements have been kept at a technical level available to junior high orchestras but will of course be effective for more advanced players as well.

Bowings agree with the solo parts, except for occasional departures to improve orchestral sound. Fingerings have been left to the players, except for a few suggested positions in the cello part. Bass parts are optional but will add to the sonority.

There have been some omissions from the complete repertory, either because the accompaniment is so intrinsically pianistic (i.e., "The Two Grenadiers") or because certain compositions seem more effective than others in group performance.

It is hoped that these string accompaniments, along with the already existing orchestrations for some of the standard repertory, will provide an added musical experience for young violinists.
