# Building Blocks 1. 2. R.H. 3. L.H. 2.

#### Comments

• The following exercises are suggested in preparation for playing the right hand:



- Measure 6 can be understood as a sequence of measure 5.
- In measures 5 and 6 the left hand is a downward sequence of building block 3. The following preparation is suggested:



• Pedal is indicated for the first two measures. Continue the same throughout.

### Activity

• Continue the melodic sequence in measures 5 and 6 in the following manner:



- Play as a single line and then add 6ths.
- The following is the beginning of a melodic improvisation which may be continued freely. Use building block 3 as the left-hand accompaniment.



# **Building Blocks**



#### Comments

- To practice the building block: C on the bottom −C on top −C in the middle.
- Use finger pattern:



(Remember: second position – second finger!)

- When you are able to play the C major chord in different positions without looking at the keyboard, play the same pattern starting on F and G.
- Left-hand note matches root of chord in right hand (C chord has C in bass, etc.). Practice this way first, then play piece as written, adding the "filler" notes in the left hand.

## Activity

• Play triad inversions using A, D, and E major chords. These chords all feel alike since they each have one black key. Try transposing *Mad for That Triad* to A major using A, D, and E major chords.
