

About These TONECHIME Arrangements

This collection contains eight favorite songs arranged for instant tonechime performance. The songs contain 22 of the 25 notes included in a basic two-octave tonechime set. There are also three extra parts included, one for you to conduct from and two extras for students who want to sing along. Just give a part to each bell ringer correlating the note indicated in the upper left-hand corner to the note of the tonechime assigned. The player will strike the note indicated in the gray box at the correct time. No understanding of note reading is necessary.

These arrangements are designed as a quick and easy way to get started making beautiful music with tonechimes. It is highly suggested that each student learn note and rhythmic reading as well as developing total understanding of tonechime performance. All of this can be accomplished quickly and easily with the TONECHIME METHOD (111). After completing this method you will be able to perform any music you like, including over 250 songs which are in THE WORLD'S GREATEST SONGBOOK (1001).

It is our hope that this publication, along with the TONECHIME METHOD and THE WORLD'S GREATEST SONGBOOK, will help you enjoy your tonechimes and, most of all, enjoy making music.
