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Peace Like a River, Kum Ba Yah is a general anthem that combines two beloved traditional spirituals. It may be especially appropriate for peace observances, baptisms, and funerals. Suggested corresponding lectionary readings include Ecclesiastes 3: 1-8, Psalm 133, John 20: 19-31, Philippians 4: 1-9, and 1 John 1: 1-10. One basic homiletical theme is the healing power of prayer.

In rehearsal, strive for gently flowing four-measure phrases with sensitively shaded dynamics that crescendo towards and decrescendo away from their centers. The near-constant eighth notes of the accompaniment create a steady flow that demands precise rhythms from the singers. Caution them to listen carefully for this underlying pulse, avoiding the temptation to slow the tempo in tied-note and dotted-note figures. The occasional intervals of the second and the seventh require a vocal tone that is relatively free of vibrato.

This anthem may be performed by treble or mixed voices. For performances by mixed voices, the following assignments are recommended:
