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### PERFORMANCE NOTES

**CELEBRATIONS AROUND THE WORLD!** is designed to teach young singers about other cultures, customs, languages and music. Use it to develop interdisciplinary study:

- Invite a geography teacher to talk about the different countries that are featured, the locations, hemispheres, longitudes and latitudes, major cities, topography, imports and exports, major crops, etc.
- Invite a language specialist to teach a few important words in each country's native language: yes, no, hello, goodbye, bathroom, count from 1-10, please, thank you, etc.
- Invite an art teacher to help students draw a map of the country, the flag, or even children wearing typical costumes of the country. Or have the teacher display art, crafts and folk art or works by famous artists from the country. Plan an art project or exhibit based on the particular art styles of the country or a specific region.
- Invite a history teacher to talk about past and recent developments in the country's politics, borders, rulers, etc.
- Invite a chef to talk about foods and perhaps cook a typical dish from each country.
- Invite a banker to show your students currency from each country and how it compares to your currency.
- Invite an ethno-musicologist to demonstrate musical instruments or play examples of folk music from each country.
- Invite a music specialist to talk about and play examples of the music of famous composers from each country.
- Invite a person from your community who was born in or lived in the country you are studying to come in and speak with your class. Prepare questions on cards.
- Invite a zoologist to talk about each country's native animals and what they eat.
- Invite a meteorologist to talk about each country's climate and typical weather patterns.
- Invite a travel agent to talk about the highlights of each country, things to see and do, how to get there from here. Maybe he/she can collect some travel posters for your hallways and classrooms.

# Plan a CELEBRATIONS AROUND THE WORLD! International Day:

Each classroom can "become a country," with small groups of students in charge of different stations around the room:

map major cities flag costumes

foods simple words/favorite expressions

currency things to see and do

folk dances climate

Have each student make a passport in art class. Then have an International Day — half of your class travels to the other classrooms, the other half stays to "man their stations" in your classroom. The next day, trade positions. The teacher stamps the passport after each student visitor has made his/her way around the classroom.

Invite parents and guardians in for an International Evening. Students should make a passport for each person attending. Serve fun finger foods in each room, reflecting the country's cuisine. Meet in a common area to sing some of the songs, let the parents travel again for a while, sing some more songs. Or ring the school bell to have parents move to the next room/country, children sing their song right in their classroom to start off or end each period.

In order to make **CELEBRATIONS AROUND THE WORLD!** into a concert program, teachers may wish to incorporate the featured "About this Holiday" information as student readings before each song. These readings can be divided so more students can participate. Feel free to add or subtract countries as needed.

About this Holiday...

The "First Thanksgiving" in 1621 was actually a traditional English harvest festival. The Pilgrims invited a few helpful *Wampanoag* (wahm-pah-noh-ahg) Indians, and told them to bring their families along for the three-day feast. The Pilgrims planned to negotiate a treaty to secure the lands on the Plymouth Plantation. The Indians brought their extended families, over 90 people, and much of the food. Over 240 years later, in 1863, Abraham Lincoln proclaimed *Thanksgiving* as an annual event to be held on the fourth Thursday in November.





#### About this Holiday...

Remembrance Day is celebrated each year in Canada to commemorate the end of World War I in 1918. In Canada, as well as other countries, it is observed with two minutes of silence at 11:00 a.m. on the 11th day of November, the 11th month. Since the early 1920's, red paper poppies have been sold and worn in memory of all who served during wartime. These poppies help raise funds for children in war-torn countries and to support war veterans and amputees.

About this Holiday...

Ramadan is a Muslim holiday celebrated in the ninth month of the Islamic calendar, which is a lunar calendar consisting of 354 days. The Muslim faith is based on the Five Pillars of Islam:

- 1. The belief in Allah, one God,
- 2. Prayer,
- 3. Giving to the poor and helping others,
- 4. Fasting,
- 5. Making a pilgrimage to Mecca, located near the Red Sea in Saudi Arabia. Fasting takes place each day from sunrise to sunset for 29 days.
