"While they were eating, Jesus took the bread, blessed it and broke it, and gave it to the disciples saying, 'Take, eat; this is My body.'
Then He took the cup, and, after giving thanks, He gave it to them, saying, 'Drink from it, all of you. For this is My blood of the covenant, which is shed for many for the forgiveness of sins.'"

Romans 12: 1-2

"Therefore I entreat you, brothers and sisters, by God's mercy, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your reasonable service. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds so that you may know God's will – that which is good and acceptable and perfect."

This transcendent communion anthem combines two beloved traditional spirituals. Let Us Break Break Together and Lord, Take Control. Suggested corresponding scripture readings include Matthew 26: 26-29, Mark 14: 22-25, Luke 22: 17-20, John 6: 35-38, Romans 12: 1-8, 1 Continuans 10: 16-21 and 1 Corinthians 11: 17-34. One basic homiletical theme is the covenant of Christ's salvation, which Christians share when they celebrate the Lord's Supper.

During worship, Let Us Break Bread Together may be sung in its entirety, or any of the following sections may be excerpted and performed as choral responses: mm. 1-10; mm. 10-25; mm. 26-42; mm. 42-56.
