





- Lay your RH flat on the closed keyboard cover.



### The Music Alphabet


The white keys on the piano are named using the first 7 letters of the alphabet. These names repeat over and over.


#### Middle



Name and play every white key on the keyboard, beginning at the low end and moving up. Use LH 3 for keys below Middle C and use RH 3 for Middle C and above.


## Climbing the Music Ladder

**Teacher:** Do not play the duet with Premier Performer.








Draw a line through the noteheads for the RH of Hush, Little Baby.

• For repeated notes, the line is straight (horizontal):




• For notes that step, the line slants slightly up or down:








Duet: Student plays one octave higher.





Play Twinkling Planets again, without the duet, Premier Performer high on the keyboard. Press the damper pedal and hold throughout the piece.




