Review: Reading Music

LESSON I: PITCH

This book assumes that you have either completed Beginning Mandolin, or you consider yourself an intermediate player because of what you have learned from a teacher or on your own. While you don't have to read music to use this book, it will definitely help if you can. This section is included as a quick review or introduction to reading standard music notation and tablature (TAB). For a more thorough treatment of the subject, pick up Beginning Mandolin.

STAFF

Music is written on a staff containing five lines and four spaces. Notes are written on the lines and spaces, which are assigned letter names from the musical alphabet: A-B-C-D-E-F-G-A-B-C, etc.

CLEF

The clef indicates which note names coincide with a particular line or space. Different clefs are used for different instruments. Mandolin music is written in G clef. The inside curl of the G clef encircles the line which is called "G." When the G clef is placed on the second line, as in mandolin music, it is called the treble clef.



Using the G clef, the notes on the staff are as follows:



LEDGER LINES

Ledger lines are used to indicate pitches above and below the staff.
