Give Me Oil in My Lamp is a rhythmic, energetic setting of the traditional Quaker hymn. The earliest biblical references to keeping a well-oiled lamp appear in the Books of Exodus and Leviticus, in which the Israelites (specifically Aaron and his sons) are instructed to keep the lamps burning for burnt offerings from evening until morning in the tent meeting area adjacent to the altar. This symbolizes an uninterrupted, ceaseless vigil of praise.

Available in multiple voicings, this highly accessible anthem is ideal for worship throughout the year. It is also appropriate for Advent, Christ the King, Eastertide, Pentecost and Thanksgiving. Corresponding scriptures include Exodus 27: 20-21, Leviticus 24: 1-4 and Matthew 25: 1-13.

Dead Williams is a free-lance lyricist living in Little Rock, Arkansas. His texts are widely published, appearing in church anthems by some of this generation's most prominent composers.
