The Show

This is a story of Daisy Gamble, who is a woman with ESP who can access her past lives, and psychiatrist Dr. Mark Bruckner, who employs hypnotism in his sessions with her to help her stop smoking. The doctor becomes enamored of Melinda Wells, a woman Daisy is revealed to have been in the 18th century, during one of her hypnotic trances. To further complicate things, Melinda falls in love with a painter named Edward Moncrief in her 18th-century "life." Subsequently, Melinda and Daisy become rivals for the doctor's affections, and Daisy flees the care of Dr. Bruckner. Eventually, Daisy and the doctor are reunited, and Bruckner learns to love the real-life Daisy. A movie of the musical in which the plot was altered, characters changed and added, and songs cut and added, was made in 1970 starring Barbra Streisand as Daisy.
