† William Brighty Rands, known by many as "The Laureate of the Nursery," is mostly remembered for his children's verses and his book on "Chaucer's England." Born to poor parents in Chelsea, South London, he was mainly self-educated. During his lifetime he worked in a warehouse, on stage, and as a clerk in an attorney's office. Eventually, he was appointed as a reporter in the committee rooms of the House of Commons. Much of his writing was done under his 30-plus pseudonyms when Parliament was not in session. His largest output were his essays—some of which were written specifically for children. His moralistic messages were told simply, with a clear understanding of the child's mind.
