Program Notes

Stephen Foster's (1826–1864) contributions as a composer are far reaching. "Camptown Races," "Oh! Susanna," and "Old Folks at Home" are some of his many pieces that have helped define the American music vernacular. Stephen Foster was unique because he made his living as a professional composer—something that was unusual in his day. *Slumber, My Darling* is a lullaby and was composed in 1862; just two years prior to the composer's death. This arrangement captures the Americana flavor with hints of Aaron Copland, Charles Ives and jazz harmonies.

Notes to the Conductor

Transparency is key to performing this piece. A lullaby, it should be gently executed but still showcase the lush harmonies provided. Dynamics should be greatly exaggerated, especially in measures 25–31. The upper strings should "feather" this passage so that the cello section may take over the melody. Moving lines should be brought out throughout. A hint of rubato may be applied to the violin solo, while the accompanying parts' pulse remains constant.
