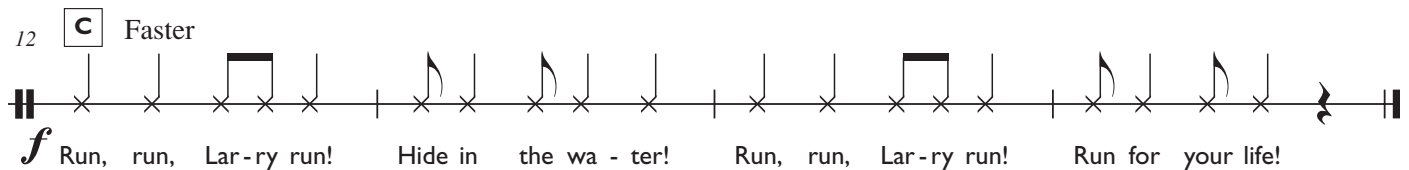
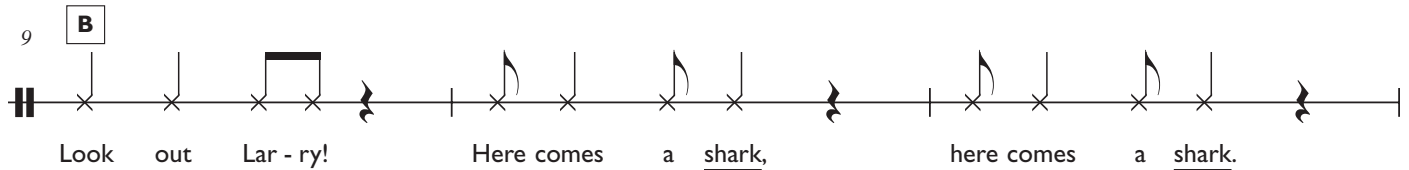

## SUGGESTIONS:

### Movement

- A** One child pretends to be Larry, playing, singing and digging.
- B** The approaching “danger” (one of the children) moves towards Larry (who doesn't seem to see the danger) as the children chant “look out, Larry.”
- C** Larry runs as everyone chants “Run, run, Larry, run.” The children choose “dangers.” Do verse after verse with a new “danger” being acted out each time. Suggestions for “Dangers:” tuna, shark, yellow tail, whale, net, kids

### Drums

- A** Play the beat with two hands on the drum during the “Larry the Lobster” verse. Tap drum lightly with finger tips on “Oh, what a guy” and “Oh my.”
- B** Play very quickly and softly, gradually getting louder for “Look out, Larry...”
- C** Play the rhythm of the rhyme loudly for “Run, run, Larry, run...”



# S.O.S. Instruments You Can Make

## Water Bottle Cap Shaker

### What You Need

*16 Water Bottle Caps per child (more or less will work fine)*

*Solder Iron*

*Braided thick blue ribbon, cording or braided scarf scraps*

*Strands of thin blue yarn, 6" in length*

### What You Do

1. Melt holes in bottle caps (adults ONLY!—to be done prior to project).
2. Thread yarn through two, three or four bottle cap holes.
3. Tie yarn with bottle caps to one of the braided loops.
4. Repeat until there are at least four yarn loops with bottle caps hanging from the braided cord.

### How to Play

1. Tie the shaker around the ankle or wrist and dance!
2. Hold one end of the braid up and shake.
3. Hold both ends of the braid. Play rhythm by bouncing the caps in the hand.
