

Background Information

Whakatauki (proverbs) play a large role in Maori culture. They are used as reference points in speeches, and also as guidelines spoken to others day by day. They are a poetic form of the Maori language, often merging historical events or holistic perspectives with underlying messages, and are extremely influential in Maori society.

Rangawhenua Tawhaki, of the *Ngati Urunumia*, *Ngati Pahere*, *Rereahu*, and *Maniapoto* tribes, was a Tohunga (spiritual leader) of immense knowledge in days of old. Today, Rangawhenua is best known as the author of the proverb, "Kia hora te marino, kia whakapapa pounamu te moana, kia tere te karohirohi."
