PROGRAM NOTES

In the Realm of Kings is inspired by the legendary tales of the English kings and castles of the High Middle Ages. Warwick, Skipton, Leeds, Arundel, and dozens of other castles scattered throughout England now stand as stoic reminders of a vibrant, yet turbulent period in European history. Beginning in the early years of the 11th century with the Battle of Hastings and the Norman Conquest of England, this era saw the population of Europe increase dramatically as technological and agricultural innovations allowed trade to flourish and crop yields to increase.

Manorialism, the organization of peasants into villages that owed rent and labor services to the nobles, and feudalism, the political structure in which knights and lower-class nobles owed military service to their lords in return for the right to rent lands and manors, were two of the ways society was organized in the High Middle Ages.

Kings became the heads of centralized nation states, reducing crime and violence and offering safety and stability to those who lived under their protection. Intellectual life was marked by scholasticism, a philosophy that embraced the joining of faith and reason, and by the founding of universities. The philosophy of Thomas Aquinas, the paintings of Giotto, the poetry of Dante and Chaucer, the travels of Marco Polo, and the architecture of Gothic cathedrals such as Chartres are among the outstanding achievements of this era.
