

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



# CHORDS DO IT YOURSELF: GUITA

A *chord* is a combination of three or more notes played at the same time. All the notes are connected by a stem unless they are whole notes, which have no stem. The stems can go either up or down, depending on where notes are located on the staff.





#### **Two-Note Exercise**


This exercise will get you used to playing two notes at a time—open B and open E. Play both strings together with one down-stroke.





#### **Three-Note Chord Exercise**

This is the first time you are playing three-note chords. All the chords in this exercise are made up of the open G, B, and E strings. Play it with your wrist free and relaxed. Remember to keep your eyes on the notes and not your hands.







## BASS-CHORD ACCOMPANIMENT

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
A popular style of playing chord accompaniments in  $\frac{4}{4}$  time breaks the chord into two parts: a single bass note followed by a chord made up of the remaining notes. On the 1st beat, play only the lowest note (called the *bass note*). Then play the rest of the chord (usually the three highest strings) on the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th beats. The complete pattern is called **bass-chord-chord**.



Another style of playing chord accompaniments in  $\frac{4}{4}$  time uses a bass note on the 1st and 3rd beats and three-string chords on the 2nd and 4th beats. This is called **bass-chord-bass-chord**.




This style of playing chord accompaniments can be adapted to  $\frac{3}{4}$  time by playing a bass note on the 1st beat and three-string chords on the 2nd and 3rd beats. This is called **bass-chord-chord**.





