




HAND AND FINGER POSITION


DO IT YOURSELF: KEYBOARD

- Curve your fingers. From above, you should see a row of knuckles but no fingernails.
- Curve the thumb slightly inward. No hitchhiker thumbs!






• There should be a hollow spot big enough for a ping-pong ball to fit in your palm.




- Fingers are used like levers with the motion coming from the joint that attaches the finger to the hand.
- Push the keys down with the tips of the fingers.
- · Keep your fingernails very short!



Fingering

Fingering numbers, which appear as the numbers 1 through 5, show which fingers to use to play. They can be found above or below the music. Each number corresponds to the same finger on either hand, with both thumbs being number 1 and both pinkies being number 5.





TIME SIGNATURES

DO IT YOURSELF: KEYBOARD

At the beginning of every piece of music are numbers called the *time signature*. The time signature tells us how to count the music.




The top number tells how many beats are in each measure.

A 4 means there are **four** beats in each measure.


The bottom number tells what kind of note gets one beat.

A 4 means a quarter note J gets one beat.

THE WHOLE REST

A whole rest indicates an entire measure of silence.









HARMONIC 2NDS & 3RDS

DO IT YOURSELF: KEYBOARD

When we play two notes together, we create *harmony*, and the intervals between these notes are called *harmonic intervals*. The 2nds and 3rds you have learned as melodic intervals can also be played as harmonic intervals.


Play these harmonic 2nds and 3rds, and notice that the 2nds have a *dissonant* (clashing) sound and the 3rds have a *consonant* (harmonious, sweet) sound.



Now that you're playing notes together with a single hand, it is even more important to learn each hand separately before putting them together.

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THE PICKUP

DO IT YOURSELF: KEYBOARD

When one or more notes are played before the first full measure at the beginning of a piece, it is called a *pickup*. The pickup measure is an *incomplete measure*. Frequently, when a piece begins with a pickup, the last measure will also

be incomplete so that the rhythmic values of the two combined equal one full measure.

Practice the C major chord with the right hand before playing "When the Saints Go Marching In."
