Performance Notes

Precision in ringing will help convey the majestic nature of this arrangement. Preparing on the "and" before each note will help bells ring together on the beat. For smaller rhytum values, ringers should play closer to the shoulder and cleanly damp as needed.

When playing *staccato*, feel the "back beat" or "rebound" from each beat to avoid rushing.

When the melody appears in lower registers, such as in mm. 43¬–50, make sure the higher accompaniment is light and doesn't drown out the melody.

When playing shakes, add visual interest by shaking in a circle.

In mm. 43–50, 4-octave choirs will have some upper treble notes out of their range. Since this is an accompaniment line, the arranger chose not to add brackets. She has left the choice to the discretion of the director.

To visually convey the majestic nature of this piece, stand tall with weight distributed evenly on both feet, and let your face reflect the joy of this beloved Christmas text.
