"Charlie was the first person that I ever heard playing electric guitar. I had heard Django Reinhardt before but that was acoustic so I wasn't really interested in that. At the time, I was living down south when I first heard those wonderful things he (Charlie) did with Benny Goodman. I thought his sound was completely wonderful—just the greatest thing I could hear in those days from the guitar. Charlie was a great influence on swing guitar players and we all learned a great deal from him. John Hammond told me that he once said to Charlie when they were recording with Benny in the studio, 'Charlie, you don't seem to ever really "come on strong" when you're rehearsing.' Charlie looked at him and said, 'I don't want to play the good stuff until the take. If I do, Benny will steal it from me.'"
