BACKGROUND INFORMATION

R. Nathaniel Dett (1882–1943) was a Black nationalistic composer, arranger, educator, conductor, pianist, essayist, and poet who transformed impressions of Black music during the early twentieth century. His most notable work is "Listen to the Lambs," based on the Negro spiritual of the same name. The oratorio *The Ordering of Moses*, using the melody from "Go Down, Moses" as a fugal theme, is considered to be his magnum opus. Dett is celebrated for his use of Black followed in choral music, and his stunning piano works and vocal solos rival some of the best classical compositions of the time.

Dett intentionally used Black folk music as source material for anthems and motets with the intention of preserving the music while creating songs for use in worship services. These songs remain true to the character of the folk songs through repeated use of the melodies, motivic development based on the rhythms and melodic contour, added polyphony, or characteristic ulioms such as call and response, syncopation, and pentatonic scales. Dett's unique use of spirituals places most of his choral music in a different category than the traditional folk song arrangements of the twentieth and twenty-first centuries.

"Deep River" was originally published in *The Dett Collection of Negro Spirituals*. This collection contains spirituals set as anthems, motets, and chorales, and was among the last few uses of existing melodies in his published choral music Dett arranged "Deep River" as "a motet especially for this book." The unaltered soprano melody appears with each iteration of the refrain. When analyzing Dett's catalog, one notices that the motets are more polypnonic than the anthems. Accompanying voices are imitative with an ascending melody, representing the singer's journey to heaven ("home over Jordan").
