## RISE UP, SHEPHERDS! for S.A.T.B. voices with soloist, a cappella



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**Rise Up, Shepherds!** is a dynamic new Christmas spiritual that incorporates the traditional Rise Up, Shepherd, and Follow. Available for both S.A.T.B. and S.S.A.B. voices, a cappella, with soloist, it is appropriate for performance by both school and church choirs.

In rehearsal, strive to differentiate between syncopated rhythmic patterns (e.g., m. 13) and those that occur precisely on the beat (e.g., m. 3). After the parts are secure, rehearse them on staccato "doo" until all voices are aligned rhythmically. Carefully inflect the text, especially the word "rise" in the two measure call to "Rise Up!" (e.g., mm. 11–12). Do not allow the meter to displace the accent to the word "up" on the second call! Sing this spiritual with intensity, but avoid the temptation to sing it too fast! One word of caution: F Major is a difficult key to keep in tune while singing a cappella. If intonation problems occur as a result of the key, you can resolve this problem by performing this spiritual one half step higher

For performance by church choirs during Christmas or Epiphany, suggested corresponding scripture readings include 1 Samuel 2: 18–21, Psalm 111, Luke 2: 1–20 & 41–52 and Colossians 3: 12–17. One basic homiletical theme is sounding the call for the family of God to rise up and follow God's Light.

Nancy Price holds B.M. and M.M. degrees in music from Ithaca College. She began singing in elementary school choirs directed by Don Besig and in her senior year of college first worked with him as a lyricist. Since 1980 they have collaborated on over 250 compositions for school and church. Both Besig and Price have received several ASCAP Special awards.

Don Besig is Director of Music at Perinton Presbyterian Church in Fairport, New York. He has over thirty years of experience teaching vocal music in the public schools of western New York. Recognizing a need for choral music written especially for student singers, Besig began composing for his own choirs. Since 1973, over 400 of his compositions and arrangements have been published.
