Introduction

Circle games have been popular for generations, studied by sociologists and musicologists, and have played an important role in childhood culture. The circle structure provides an inclusive space and a valuable opportunity for students to interact with each other while taking part in a shared musical activity. Whether sitting or standing, remaining in place or performing movements, these simple melodies and lyrics have a lasting impact.

Circle of Song invites students to learn musical concepts and express themselves through songs, games, and planned movements. Using traditional melodies taught by rote, the activities include passing on the beat, working with partners, hiding/finding items, folk dances, circle choreography, guessing games, and more (see below for an index of activity types).

Use these mini-lessons as primary instruction, practice, extension, and/or retention of curricular objectives. From a social-emotional learning perspective, circle activities address social awareness and relationship skills.

Circle of Song will encourage students to:

- Develop spatial awareness
- Engage in social interaction
- Respond to music through movement
- Practice motor skills
- Understand the social aspect of music-making
- Communicate with others
- Build confidence
- Cooperate
- Be creative
- Smile

After learning these fun singing games, students will ask for them over and over again, and remember them for years to come.

Learning Targets


I can sing with others.

Resources Needed


Real or plastic apple Classroom rhythm instruments

Instructions

1. Teach the song with the hand signs for *la*, *sol*, *mi*, and *do* pitches.



- 2. Point out that the last pitch makes the song sound final or completed. This pitch is do, or the "home tone."
- 3. Instruct students to form a seated circle.
- 4. Sing the song while passing the apple around the circle on the beat.
- 5. The student holding the apple on the last word of the song will leave the circle and select a rhythm instrument to play on the steady beat.
- 6. Repeat until one player remains.







Button! Button!

Learning Targets

I can sing alone and with others.

Resources Needed

One large button

Instructions

- 1. Teach the song.
- 2. Instruct students to form a standing circle, then place their hands in a cupped formation behind their back.
- 3. Assign one student to walk around the outside of the circle and drop the button into one of the student's hands. No fair peeking!
- 4. Designate another student to stand in the center of the circle, sing the song, and point to whoever they think has the button at the conclusion of the song.
- 5. If their guess is correct, they remain in the middle of the circle until they make an incorrect guess or several times have passed. If their guess is incorrect, they trade places with that student.
- 6. Select a different person to hide the button each time.
