Antonio Vivaldi (1628-1741) is best known for his more than 400 concertos, mostly for strings, but for many other instruments as well. He also wrote about 40 operas.

The melodies in *Laudamus Te* come from Vivaldi's "Gloria," an extended choral work with orchestra. They have been edited and simplified for performance. The arrangement was commissioned by the Northern Utah Arts Consortium Youth Choir, grades 4-8, Lynnette Loughton, guest conductor.

In Latin, all vowel sounds should be pure and unchanging. Below is a pronunciation and translation guide for use with this piece.

Laudamus te Lah-oodah-moos teh (We praise Thee)

Benedicimus te Beh-neh-dee-chee-moos teh (We bless Thee)

Adoramus te Ah-daw-rah-moos teh (We worship Thee)

Glorificamus te Glaw-ree-fee-kah-moos teh (We glorify Thee)
