## **NOTES TO THE CONDUCTOR**

The opening four-measure pyramidal effect culminates in a majestic statement of the theme from "Rhapsody in Blue." Dynamic markings should be carefully observed in measure 9. The use of a large auto bulb horn in measures 38 to 51 is not mandatory, but would be effective. The clarinet and horn solos in measures 60 to 64 should be performed with great freedom. Be sure to observe the *molto rit*. in measure 94. Again, the alto saxophone and baritone solos in measures 120 to 129 should be performed freely. The slow theme beginning in measure 130 should be conducted with great warmth and expression—tempo and dynamic markings are "suggested." The final rhumba rhythm should "sneak" in (measure 174) and build for four measures. Be sure the bass line (measure 178) is played lightly and never overbearing. The ending (measure 230) should build from *p* to *ff* and be executed with precision and fervor.
