### THE THIRD SONG OF ISAIAH

Nearly twenty-five years ago THE FIRST SONG OF ISAIAH (Surely It Is God Who Saves Me) was published. Since then it has enjoyed consistent popularity. A large part of its appeal is that it can effectively be performed in a simple, meditative way or as a festival celebration with multiple resources. To assist in the latter, a Festival Edition was published in 1996, marking the twentieth anniversary of publication.

THE FIRST SONG OF ISAIAH has also enjoyed universal acceptance. Its Old Testament text makes it useful not only in Judeo-Christian communities, but also in multi-faith gatherings, where all can unite in the words of the great prophet's testimony of faith in his God. Many churches use it regularly as a weekly canticle. It has also been used for special occasions ranging from weddings to memorial services, ordinations, Bar and Bat Mitzvahs, formal concerts and campfire sings.

It is our hope that THE THIRD SONG OF ISAIAH offers this same flexibility and ecumenical appeal. This work was commissioned by the Diocese of West Missouri to honor their bishop, the Right Reverend John Clark Buchanan, and his wife, Peggy, on the occasion of his retirement. THE FIRST SONG OF ISAIAH has been widely used in that diocese, and it was their request that a setting of Isaiah's "Third Song" be the composition to honor their beloved Bishop and his wife for their many years of faithful service.

To perform THE THIRD SONG OF ISAIAH in its simplest version, performers should start with the pickup to measure 9, omitting the Festival Introduction, and take the original ending. For more festive occasions, the Festival Introduction (measures 1 - 8) and alternate Festival Ending (measures 91a - 99a) may be used. An optional publication is available (GCMRM0001A) which contains a conductor's score and parts for two trumpets, two trombones, and timpani, any or which could be added in performance. As with THE FIRST SONG OF ISAIAH, a congregational part is included in the choral score to enable and encourage the congregation to participate in this joyous work.

However done, simply or fully adorned, let the inspiring words of Isaiah shine forth!



















