PERFORMANCE NOTES

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart is probably the most famous of all composers, certainly the most famous classical composer. (We generally attribute the classical period to the years 1750 to 1820.) He lived only 35 years yet composed more than 600 pieces of all types. This famous motet (a sacred choral work) was written in 1791, the year of Mozart's death. It is one of the most popular choral works ever written by Mozart and was originally written for four-part choir, organ, and strings.

The English translation of this Latin text speaks to the following Christian prayer:

Jesus, Word of God incarnate, born of the Virgin Mary.
On the cross, his flesh was torn with nails to atone for the sins of man.
Cleanse your people by your blood and water.
Feed us with your broken body, now and forever more.

However, as with other Latin texts, this motet cannot be performed stylistically correct in English. For this reason, the English translation has not been written under the Latin text in this edition (so that it can't be sung in English). Actually, the Latin is much easier to sing than English, because it uses five pure vowels: aw, ehw, ee, oh, and oo. Notice the pronunciation of aw rather than ah and ehw rather than eh. In this manner a choral blend may be achieved. Make sure that the singers sing the ee vowel with an oo on the lips, thereby blending the vowel.

This piece should be sung reserved and never pushed. In addition, try to achieve proper Latin text accents, such as:

Á-ve vé-rum cor-pus Ex-á-mi-ne per-fo-rá-tum

I hope your choir enjoys performing this beautiful Mozart work.
