

## A BRIEF HISTORY OF BUBBLE GUM

Weeks later as Bubbles was recovering in the hospital, a nurse got tired of Bubbles incessant talking and shoved a wad of the new product in her mouth. Well, the rest is history.

† Historical note: The musical expression "Short dramatic pause" was first coined by the inventor of bubblegum, Buehla Mae "Bubbles" Lawrence. She originally used this expression in reference to her pet kitty who had short dramatic paws.
