Eleanor Daley received her Bachelor of Music Degree in Organ Performance from Queen's University, Kingston, Ontario, and holds diplomas in both organ and piano performance from the Royal Conservatory of Toronto, and Trinity College in England. She has been the Director of Music at Fairlawn Heights United Church in Toronto, Ontario, since 1982, and is currently the conductor of four choirs there.

As a freelance accompanist, Ms. Daley has worked with numerous choirs, including the Toronto Children's Chorus, the Canadian Children's Opera Chorus, the Bach Children's Chorus, and the Elmer Iseler Singers. She is currently the regular accompanist for the Amadeus Choir of Greater Toronto.

Ms. Daley has been the recipient of numerous awards in the Amadeus Choir Christmas Carol and Chandran Song Competition, a competition held annually in Toronto. One of these carols, *Rejoice and Sing This Christmas Morn*, has been recorded by the Toronto Mendelssohn Choir on the Attic label entitled, "Christmas In Roy Thomson Hall," Elmer Iseler, conductor.

Ms. Daley's *Requiem* was awarded the 1994 National Choral Award for Outstanding Choral Composition of the Year by the Association of Canadian Choral Conductors (ACCC) at their National Convention in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan.
