
## Dhalgren - Splinters of Reality

There are three audio tracks (at a reduced speed of \$=240), of which the first (Ex. 11) is the original subdivided drum click with the principal accents and a meter of 4-4-3-3-4-4-3, while on the second track (Ex. 12) we have the principal accents for the udu drum loop following the same meter as the original click. On track 3 (Ex. 13) we have the principal accents for the tambourine loop; with this meter all on upbeats, for practical reasons I have chosen to mark each downbeat.




## Dragon Fly

This track basically consists of a percussion loop (riqq and udu drum) in 10/16 with a subdivided meter of 2-3-2-3. The main drum groove consists of two different moods, the first with a more closed, introverted sound (played on hi-hat) and the other a more open sound (played on cymbals); there is also a drum solo that returns to the principal groove at the end of the track.

Note that this type of 2-3 meter is not very common; meters such as 5/4 or 5/8 are more usually interpreted as 3-2. This is one of the reasons why this passage represents a useful exercise for a student.

There are three audio tracks of which the first (Ex. 14) is the main click, subdivided at a reduced speed of  $\stackrel{>}{}=90$ ; the second track (Ex. 15) is the main rhythm of the udu drum loop with a meter of 2-3-2-3; the third track (Ex. 16) is the main tambourine rhythm with a meter of 2-5-2-1.







