

is a QUARTER NOTE. It gets 1 count.

is a HALF NOTE. It gets 2 counts.

o is a WHOLE NOTE. It gets 4 counts.

is a TIME SIGNATURE, called 4/4 Time. There are 4 counts in each measure and each quarter note gets 1 count.

THIS IS B (Thumb and 1st finger of left hand)



Playing Tips

1. Hold the instrument firmly, but lightly.

Place the mouthpiece between the lips and tighten them a little so that air cannot escape around the mouthpiece.


3. Don't put the mouthpiece too far into your mouth. You mustn't let it touch your teeth.

 Take a good natural breath before beginning each phrase.

5. Start each tone with the tongue placed behind the teeth. Make a "T" sound and continue with "oo" as the sound continues.

On lower notes, the "Too" sound should be changed to a "Doo" sound to make these notes easier to play.

7. Blow an even, steady stream of air through the instrument.









This curved line between two notes of the same pitch is called a Tie. The value of the two notes is added together. Instead of tonguing the 2nd note, hold it smoothly, adding its value to the value of the 1st note.



The curved line between, over or under notes not of the same pitch is called a Slur. It tells you to play the slurred notes "smooth and connected", which is the definition of Legato. Do not tongue the 2nd note, but connect it to the first note.
