Lesson one Pulse and rhythm

Fact file

Pulse is the heartbeat of music. It's regular like the 'tick, tock' of a clock. If it stops, call an ambulance quick! **Rhythm** is made up of long and short sounds that move along to the 'tick, tock' of the pulse.

Rhymes and rhythms

Say 'Tick, tock' like a clock while your teacher says the rhyme, and then swap over.

The language of music



Piano and forte are Italian words, like pizza and pasta. Try these tricky tongue-twisters to help you remember them.



6 Peter put a piece of pizza, on a peaceful piano. 🕇 (Whisper and clap the rhythm with one finger)

Fifty four foghorns, formed a forte fanfare.

(Shout and stamp your feet)
