Whole Tone Scale – The whole tone scale is built *entirely of whole steps*. It has a unique exotic sound. There are only two such scales. Although other whole tones scales may use different accidentals or start on a different note, they all sound the same as scale No. 1 or scale No. 2, shown in the Finger Workout below.

Whole tone scale No. 1 is used in "Mexican Clap Hands Dance" and "Yankee Doodle." Scale No. 2 is used in "Frere Jacques." The last measure of each piece uses notes that are *not* part of the whole tone scale. This is done to make the endings sound more conclusive.

Creation

Hymn and choir music uses music notation with different note stems to show the four different voice parts.

Soprano and alto parts are in the treble staff. Soprano notes have stems UP – alto notes have stems DOWN.

Tenor and bass parts are in the bass staff. Tenor notes have stems UP – bass notes have stems DOWN.

For preparatory practice, play each voice part separately, starting with soprano and moving downward.

The "Creation" is an **oratorio** – a *religious* story set to music. Like an opera (see page 26), it has vocal solos, ensembles and choruses with orchestral accompaniment. However, an oratorio is performed in a *concert hall*, not a theater. It has no scenery, costumes or props. This piece is a transcription from the original choral-orchestral version. The complete score of Haydn's "Creation" takes over two hours to perform!
