Tyrannosaurus

Tyrannosaurus (tie-ran-o-SAWR-us), “king of the tyrant dinosaurs,” ruled the ancient lands that are now Montana and Wyoming before his extinction. He was the last and largest of the meat-eating dinosaurs. When standing on two powerful hind legs, he stood about 18 feet tall. His huge head had very strong jaws containing dozens of curved, saw-like teeth. At a typical weight of 6 tons, he was much too heavy to run swiftly, so he feasted on other plant-eating dinosaurs that were easy to catch.
