STANDARD BOWING TERMS

abgesetzt, abgesetzet, (G.) Separated; often used together with or as a synonym for abgestossen, the usual German term for *staccato* (in the generic sense of the term, not the particular type of bowing). Historically, Quantz uses *abgesetzet* to mean lifting the bow from the string and replacing it. He states that the bow is lifted and replaced on the string in such passages as:

1) in syncopated rhythms, in which the bow is lifted after the syncopated note to give a lively expression to the rhythm



- 2) after the note preceding an appoggiatura, for greater clarity;
- in rhythmic patterns in which two down-bows are used in succession, such as



4) in passages marked with dashes (Strichelchen) or labeled staccato, as long as the notes are not too fast. Eighth notes in allegro movements and sixteenth notes in allegretto tempo are considered too fast for lifted bows; Quantz says that the bow should not leave the string when playing them, as they will sound hacked or whipped. Separation (Absatz) is used in the pattern



in *allegro*, with successive up-bows as indicated, but the bow is *not* lifted. A succession of lifted up-and-down-bows may be found only in passages of moderate speed. (Quantz, *Versuch einer Anweisung die Flute traversière zu spielen*, 1752). By 1802 when Koch's dictionary was published, *abgesetzet* was simply a synonym for *abgestossen*. (Koch, *Musikalisches Lexikon*, 1802). The term is used by other writers to indicate merely a separation between notes, without any implications of the degree or means of separation.

See abgestossen, détaché, piqué, reprise d'archet, spiccato, staccato, and stoccato.

abgezucht (G.) An eighteenth century term listed by Walther as a synonym for *détaché*. (Walther, *Musikalisches Lexikon*, 1732). Obsolete.

above fingers (abbreviated AF). A 20th century term used for cello and bass to indicate a special bow placement on the string between the left hand fingers and the nut. This produces a tiny, distant and muted tonal effect.

absetzen (G.) To play with separated bow-strokes. See abgesetzt.

abgestossen (G.) Staccato (in the generic musical sense); the normal term in German for musical staccato. Gestossen is also occasionally used in this sense. (Mozart, Gründliche Violinschule, 1756). The nonmusical meaning of the root of these terms in fencing is similar to that of the Italian term stoccata: stossen, to thrust, stab, or strike; stoccata, a rapier-thrust. Thus the implication, when these terms were first used as technical terms in music, may have been a vigorous type of separation. In time, the meaning came to mean staccato, without specifying the means of separation. See détaché, gestossen, staccato, stoccato, and stabb.

abstossen (G.) To play staccato. See *abgestossen*, *détaché*, *staccato*. **Abstrich** (G.) See *down-bow*.
